#### Instructions

To gather more quantitative insights in what individual signatories are contributing to the DISCO goals in the upcoming years and how the partnership is progressing jointly, the Steering Committee agreed that all signatories will develop and publish individual action plans. These action plans show how they are contributing to the DISCO goals in the upcoming 3 years (until end 2026), and:

- are based on the commitments from the <u>DISCO declaration</u>;
- have a strong link with the indicators from the ISCO Reporting Framework;
- explain how the principles on procurement practices as laid down in the DISCO procurement practices position paper, are being implemented by DISCO signatories.

You are asked to fill below template and submit it by <u>30 June 2024 the latest</u> to the DISCO Secretariat: Mark de Waard, <u>dewaard@idhtrade.org</u> and Lisa Graepel, <u>graepel@idhtrade.org</u>.

After submission, all DISCO action plans will be published on the DISCO website. The DISCO Secretariat will analyse and summarise the action plans. The outcomes of this analysis will be shared and discussed during the annual General Assembly at the end of 2024.

For more guidance on defining the actions around the three impact themes, it is recommended to consult the DISCO Roadmaps on <u>living income</u>, <u>deforestation and forest degradation</u>, and <u>child labour</u>. For more information on the quantitative targets, the definitions and usage of the indicators, please consult the <u>ISCO Reporting Framework</u>.

All action plans will cover the period 2024-2026. The quantitative targets **track progress cumulatively until the end of 2026**, **including what's already been achieved.** Progressive targets with intermediate milestones could also be included. It is also requested to give a brief qualitative description. Where needed, references to a more comprehensive description of the strategy could be included.

# Plans on DISCO ambitions to enable living incomes

# Contribution to closing living income gaps

Describe in max. 200 words what your organizations' plans are to contribute to the partnership's goals on closing living income gaps.

- We will continue to be instrumental in disseminating the DISCO position paper on
  procurement practices and advocating that companies incorporate the 3 core principles in
  their individual strategy to close the LI gap from the families they are sourcing from and
  integrate the LI gap measurement into their sustainability programs
- Support the roll-out of the joint statement on LI and procurement practices developed by the ISCOs secretariats and endorsed by all ISCOs during the WCC in Brussels. If and where feasible, improve the compromise with a set of unified and ambitious principles to place

- responsible procurement practices on top of the living income agendas, and advocate for the implementation of the principles in DISCO
- Support initiatives and strategies (studies, calls for action, campaigns, etc.) that promote a fair
  distribution of value in the supply chain, better management of risks for cocoa producers and
  enable a living income for cocoa farmers as a key aspect of economic sustainability. We will
  do that, among others, in cooperation with the VOICE Network and through the publication of
  the upcoming Cocoa Barometer and related consultation papers.
- Disseminate findings of the 2024 cocoa Barometer to accelerate progress towards reducing the average living income gap of cocoa producers and adopting responsible purchasing practices. This includes advocating for the LIRP paid to all farmers by 2025
- Raise awareness among Dutch citizens about farmers' income, value distribution in the chain, the need to close the LI gap and payment of decent prices to farmers
- Through the CSOs in ISCOs platform, we'll support monitoring and reporting on the ISCO
  objectives, including on procurement practices, using a set of jointly defined KPIs to track
  progress and strengthen the accountability of all members
- Through Solidaridad regional offices in West Africa, we'll continue to engage with relevant stakeholders on the ground (government, private sector and civil society organisations) to implement a smart-mix of LI strategies to be able to close living income gaps, as defined in the Voice Consultative Paper, and ensure that most cocoa families reach a LI by 2030
- Support the implementation of the recently adopted CSDDD for its potential of providing benefits to smallholder farmers through human right protection, shared responsibilities and fair purchasing practices, and contribute to the development of sector guidance and thematic guidelines when developed by the European Commission.

Building on the three principles of the DISCO Position Paper on Procurement Practices Principle 1: Farmers are adequately remunerated so that sustainable cocoa farming can be profitable and enables them to earn a living income.

Principle 2: Farmers and farmer groups are reliably and promptly paid for the cocoa beans supplied.

Principle 3: Farmers and farmer groups have assurances from their off-takers in the form of longer

By the end of 2026, we will continue to advocate for a smallholder inclusive implementation of the EUDR and the inclusion of living income and living wage in the CSDDD.

# Plans on DISCO ambitions to end deforestation and forest degradation

Contribution to end deforestation and forest degradation

Describe in max. 200 words what your organizations' plans are to contribute to the partnership's goals on ending deforestation and forest degradation.

- Support the smooth implementation of the EUDR: advocate with EU and Dutch policy makers
  for smallholder inclusive implementation of the EUDR to create a positive impact in origin
  countries, both for the environment and for farmers; support governments in origin countries
  and work closely with the EC to limit disengagement risks for the most vulnerable farmers
- Support origin country governments to align/improve their legal and institutional framework and unify the traceability systems, not only to comply with the EUDR, but also to create an enabling environment to preserve forests and strengthen the resilience of cocoa communities
- Through our regional offices in West Africa, we'll continue to advocate with policy makers in GH and CDI for improved on-farm tree ownership, land tenure, land access, and ownership security. This remains a major obstacle to farm resilience through Agroforestry and other forest restoration schemes
- We'll explore the opportunities of climate finance including carbon credits and payment for environmental services (PES) to improve farmers' income in origin countries (e.g. the newly launched <u>partnership</u> between Solidaridad and the World Bank in Ghana)

# Plans on DISCO ambitions to end child labour

#### Contribution to end child labour

- We will continue our lobbying and advocacy work with EU and Dutch policy makers for smallholder-inclusive legislation that creates a positive impact in origin countries and for farmers
- In collaboration with representatives of the private sector, civil society organisations and other stakeholders, we'll contribute to the strategic direction of ICI's work on child labour in Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire
- Engage with companies through various platforms and encourage them to improve, develop and invest in CLMRS in their supply chain, including the definition of more robust and accurate KPIs for ISCO companies

 Advocate a multi-dimensional approach to combating child labour, including recognition of the importance of cultural and socio-economic context in the root causes of child labour.
